




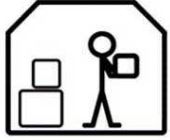
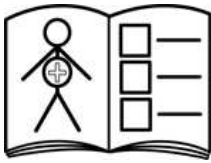


**Rutland Learning Disability Partnership Board

4. Updates

Keeping Safe Sub Group: Carol told us that at their last meeting they talked about Stranger Awareness. The next meeting will be on 28 August at 2.15 pm in Wytchley. They will talk about safety in the home.

Employment: as Glynn was not able to attend the meeting, Carol gave us his updates:

- They would like more customers at The Shed café which is open on Wednesdays 10 am to 1.30 pm.
- There are new opportunities for volunteering.
- JobCentre+ is holding a 'Have A Go' Job Fair on Wednesday 28 August at Victoria Hall.

Glynn can give people more information about these items.

Better Health: there had been no meeting since the last Partnership Board. The next meeting is tomorrow.

Advocacy: As Julie was not able to attend, there was nothing to report.

Person Centred Planning: At the last Partnership Board meeting Carol asked people to give their views about the Person Centred Subgroup. These views were discussed at the PCP meeting and they decided on the following:

- Instead of regular meetings, they will hold a big Person Centred Day in January 2014.
- The PCP Sub-Group section of the Partnership Board website will be kept up to date.
- They will look at starting an Online Forum.

A planning meeting for the Person Centred Day will be held on 26 November.

5. Vision Day – Carole Sloane

Carole told us about changes the government is planning which will make things better for children with special educational needs and disabilities. Rutland wants to be ready if the changes become law in 2014, so a meeting called a Vision Day was arranged in June. Lots of people who work in children's services attended. They looked at what needs to be done and agreed a plan for the next year.

Carole told us there is a lot of work to do. She is happy to



come back to Partnership Board in the future to tell us what has been happening.



6. Winterbourne View – Vicky Todd

This is the name of a special hospital in Gloucestershire where people with challenging behaviour lived. In 2011 it was discovered that staff had been abusing patients for a long time. The case was on television and people were very shocked to hear what had been happening there.

A big investigation was carried out. People wanted to know how this had happened, and to make sure it could never happen again. New rules were agreed to protect disabled people.

The staff who had carried out the abuse were sent to jail. The hospital has been closed.



7. Mencap 'Raising our Sights' – Emmajane Perkins

'Raising Our Sights' is the name of a government report on services for people with Profound and Multiple Learning Disabilities. It was written because Valuing People Now were concerned that people with PMLD were not always receiving the support they need to live a good life.

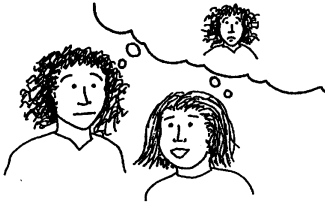

- Services that help me least
- Ideas for new services
